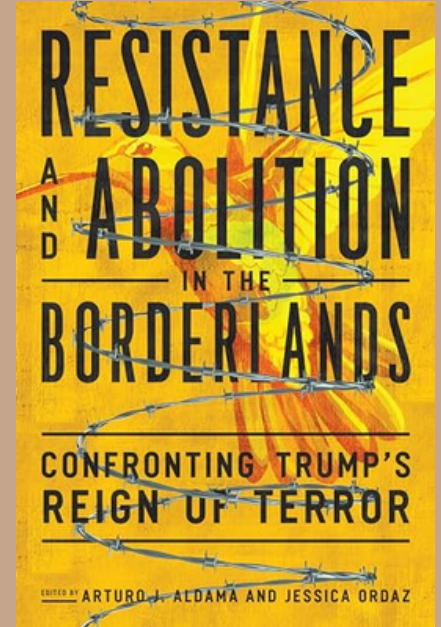

Community Award**

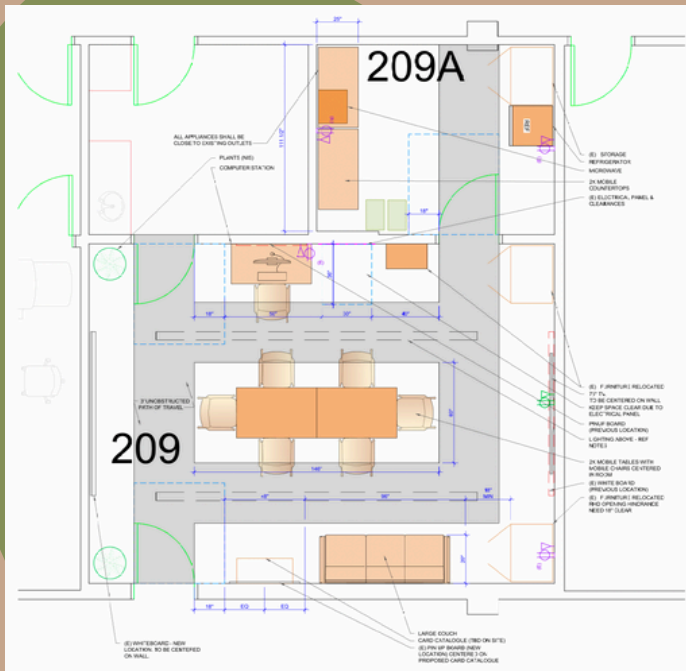

Space Renovation

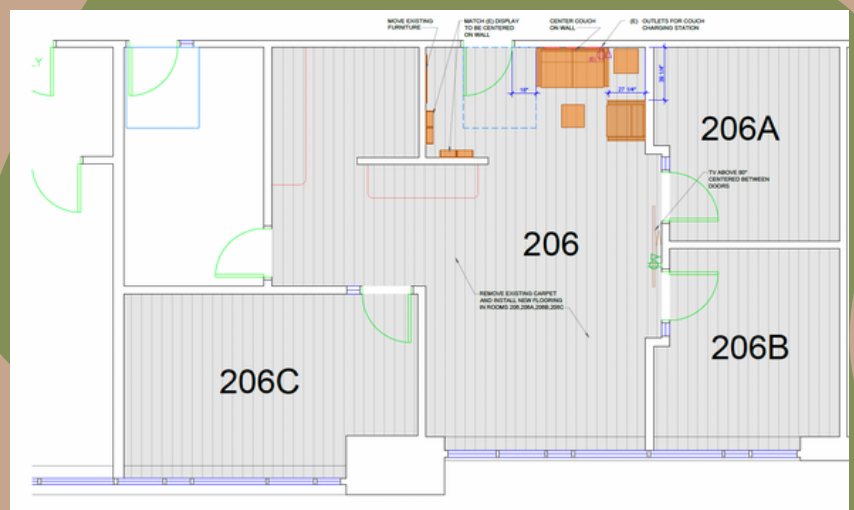


1 BSS 209: Ethnic Studies Resource Lab

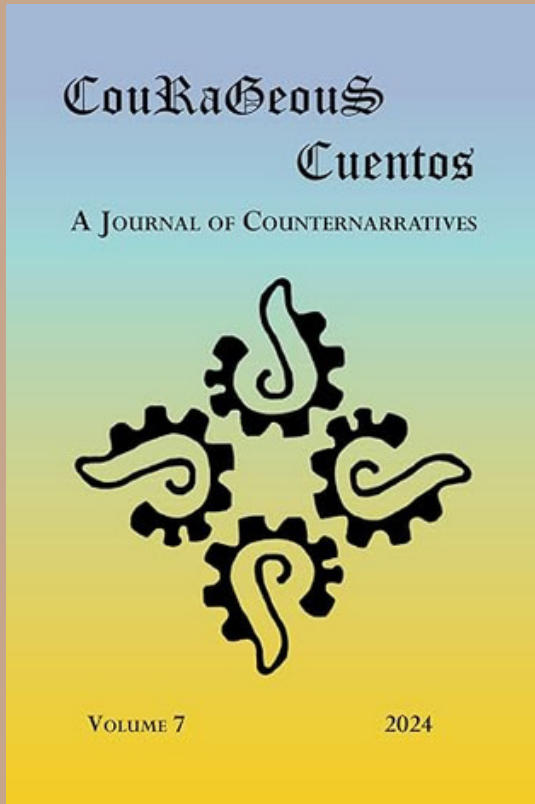

Grand Opening: Rou Dalagurr Food Sovereignty Lab and Traditional Ecological Knowledges Institute



In 2019, Cal Poly Humboldt students had a vision for a project that would re-Indigenize the campus while bringing lasting benefits to the community, building partnerships across campus, and reconnecting students with place. The project envisioned was the Cal Poly Humboldt Native American Studies (NAS) Rou Dalagurr Food Sovereignty Lab and Traditional Ecological Knowledges Institute (FSL). Alongside funding and support from the Ethnic Studies Council for materials, IT equipment; and supplies, construction broke ground on October 8th 2021 following a student-led effort which raised over \$250,000. The FSL opened in Spring of 2024, and is dedicated to the learning, research, hands-on practice and preservation of food sovereignty and Traditional Ecological Knowledges (TEK).

The Rou Dalagurr Food Sovereignty Lab is a space designed to facilitate research, foregrounding Indigenous sovereignty and self-determination over how their knowledges are approached, researched, engaged with, represented, and managed. It benefits from guidance provided by a Steering Committee including faculty and staff from Cal Poly Humboldt, representatives appointed by each of the tribal nations in Humboldt/Del Norte Counties, and student representatives from Food Sovereignty focused tribal organizations. This Steering Committee reviews lab policies and procedures and provides feedback on projects and programs, and continually works to provide insight and partnership building with other organizations, institutes, institutions and businesses interested in engaging with Food Sovereignty and TEK.

Following the grand opening in Spring 2024, the Rou Dalagurr Food Sovereignty Lab now provides an opportunity to work directly with students, surrounding communities, tribal nations, national and international scholars and community leaders to center, learn, and engage with Indigenous science, environmental management, and preservation practices.

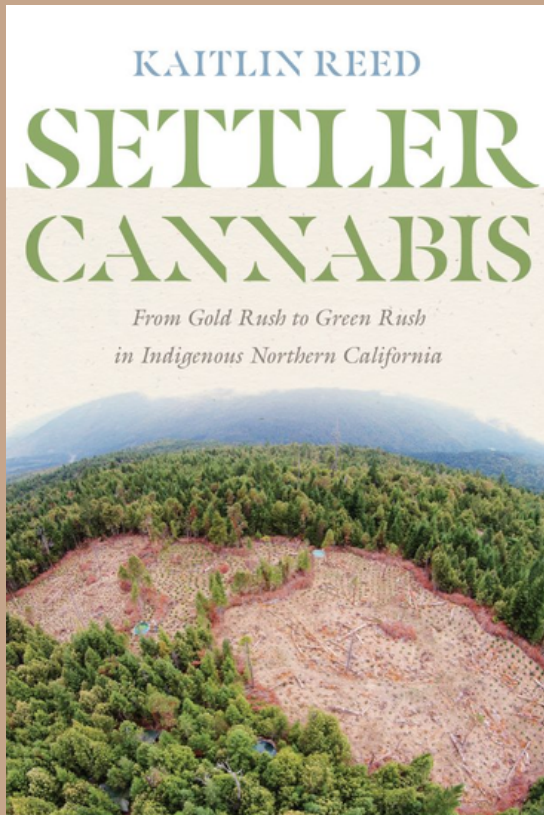
ENVIRONMENT & COMMUNITY

Ethnic Studies at Cal Poly Humboldt is proud to support the latest *Decolonizing Sustainability Speaker Series*, featuring scholars from across Turtle Island gathered to share their scholarship and contributions with Cal Poly Humboldt and the surrounding community.

The Decolonizing Sustainability Speaker Series critically engages with a range of topics including settler colonialism, white supremacy, patriarchy, and other systems of power, privilege and oppression that unsettle ‘sustainability’ politics, discourse and governance relevant to climate change and environmental movements.

The 2023-4 Decolonizing Sustainability Speaker Series featured several esteemed scholars. Dr. Andrew Curley (Diné; University of Arizona) presented on the energy transition in Native North America, drawing upon his recently published book *Carbon Sovereignty: Coal, Development, and Energy Transition in the Navajo Nation* (University of Arizona Press, 2023). Dr. Wendy Makoons Geniusz (Cree/Métis; York University) gave a talk comparing the ways in which Anishinaabe botanical knowledge is presented in the academic record, with how it is preserved in Anishinaabe culture, drawing upon their recently published book *Our Knowledge Is Not Primitive: Decolonizing Botanical Anishinaabe Teachings* (Syracuse University Press, 2023). Dr. Aaron Gregory’s talk exploring the future-primitive chronopolitics of lithium extraction and the renewable energy revolution was rescheduled for Fall Semester 2024, and will present findings from ongoing research situated at the nexus of Science & Technology Studies (STS) and Critical Indigenous Studies.

Featured Publication (NAS)



Ethnic Studies is excited to feature Dr. Kaitlin Reed recently published text, *Settler Cannabis: From Gold Rush to Green Rush in Indigenous Northern California* (University of Washington Press, 2023). Dr. Reed is an Associate Professor with the Native American Studies (NAS) Department and TEK Faculty Fellow at Cal Poly Humboldt. Dr. Reed's celebrated book traces patterns of dispossession and resource rushing—gold, timber, fish, and now cannabis—to reveal their impacts on Indigenous cultures, lands, waters, and bodies in Northern California. Situating the cannabis industry within this broader legacy, Dr. Reed anticipates an alternative future that begins with the return of land to Indigenous stewardship, rejecting the commodification and control of nature for profit. Combining archival research with interviews and testimonies from tribal members and state employees, *Settler Cannabis* offers a groundbreaking analysis of the environmental consequences of cannabis cultivation by foregrounding Indigenous voices, experiences, and histories.
